# BEND POLICE DEPARTMENT QUARTERLY REPORT



Summer is here, and that means lots of people out and about - on foot, on the water, and on bikes. And boy have we seen an increase in the number of people riding electric bikes all over town!

We've been trying to get the word out about some of the most common laws we see being broken - kids under 16 riding e-bikes, e-bikes on sidewalks, and e-bikes not following the rules of the road, as well as electric toys that aren't street legal. To get the word out, we've engaged in an education campaign with radio, TV and newspaper interviews, social media posts, and even public service announcements.

That campaign has provided a lot of feedback. Some people ask why we're wasting our time on something they consider trivial. Others think we're not doing enough, that we should be taking bikes away and stationing multiple officers in parks across the westside.

The answer, like most, lies somewhere in the middle. Our officers respond to hundreds of calls for service each day, and many of them are emergencies - DUII drivers, assaults in progress, child and domestic abuse. That doesn't always leave a lot of time to do proactive enforcement of people unsafely riding e-bikes. But we also recognize that this is a serious concern for many community members, and we also know that people riding bikes unsafely can lead to deadly crashes and other injuries.

So, we need the public's help. If you have a child under the age of 16, please don't buy them an e-bike they legally cannot ride. If you have an e-bike in your home already, ensure anyone who is going to ride it knows all the rules of the road. If we all work together, we can keep Bend the safe community we know and love.




## Fleet Camera System Installed

In July 2022, the Bend City Council approved a five-year, \$679,500 contract with Axon to install a fleet camera system in all Bend Police Department vehicles, paving the way for Bend officers to increase law enforcement accountability and have additional public safety equipment at their fingertips. The contract provided for the purchase and installation of the cameras, as well as software and video storage.

In June, Axon technicians installed the Axon fleet camera systems in all patrol vehicles. Now, every patrol officer uses a body-worn camera and vehicle camera during their shifts.

The goal of these camera systems is to further increase the transparency of our local law enforcement actions, as well as to improve public safety, reduce crime and assist in prosecution efforts. The camera systems serve as an effective tool for helping the public access and understand interactions between officers and community members. All video recordings will be stored in a secure cloud location, and the Deschutes County District Attorney's Office will have the ability to review the recordings.



"We are pleased that the installation of our in-car camera systems is nearly complete," Police Chief Mike Krantz said. "This technological advancement marks a significant milestone in our commitment to enhance safety, transparency and accountability. The state-of-the-art system also enhances our ability to capture critical evidence. We are committed to using technology to improve our service to the community. The City of Bend Police Department will continue to be at the forefront of innovation in public safety."




## Total Calls For Service

● Total Calls ● Calls Year-to-Date


