Second, make sure your visitors treat Bend with respect as well. Sometimes we see out-of-towners act as though Bend is Las Vegas, drinking in public and behaving badly. There are rules here and everyone needs to follow them, so make sure your friends know the laws.

Finally, take a minute to consider whether you can avoid using police services. For example, if you get into a fender bender and can exchange information and drive your vehicles from the scene, you don't need to contact law enforcement. Can you talk to your neighbors about their barking dogs, or their parking issues, instead of asking law enforcement to do it for you? We're happy to help, but sometimes we don't need to be involved at all!


Quarterly In-Service Focuses on Active Threat Training



In June, Bend Police officers participated in a full-day in-service training that focused on active threat scenarios. Held at the Deschutes County Fair & Expo Center, officers worked on high-speed driving skills and vehicle placement, as well as a variety of scenarios involving active shooters.

The culmination of the day was a scenario that combined the driving skills and active threat work. Officers in pairs were dispatched to an active threat, then responded to the fairgrounds, encountered and engaged the suspects to end the threat.

Training like this takes a lot of planning and effort, but it helps our officers be ready to face these situations head on.






Total Calls for Service
